Unilever House

Unilever House is sited on the original location of Henry VIII's Bridewell Palace, which he occupied after the Royal Apartments in Whitehall were destroyed by fire. It has also been the site of the De Keyser Royal Hotel that provided accommodation to Victorian London from 1875, and it is from this institution that Lord Leverhulme leased the site to build his London headquarters. He commissioned the construction of Unilever House in 1920.

The impressive curved façade has been synonymous with the Unilever company and has provided a strategic global headquarters since it was occupied in 1932.

In 2004 Unilever commissioned Bovis Lendlease/Stanhope along with KPF Architects to refurbish the property, radically reconfiguring the internal floor plans and lightwells to create a more open environment whilst retaining the original architectural detail.

PAYE Stonework were employed to sympathetically restore the facades, rectifying previous adaptations and repairs. The result is a façade which revives the original character and landmark status of the building.
