The Grange Ramsgate

The Grange is a rare and largely unaltered example of the work of Augustus Pugin, completed in 1844 and listed Grade I. However, at the start of 2005 it was considered to be in such a poor condition that it was on the English Heritage 'Buildings at risk' register.

It had remained in the Pugin family until 1928, after which it became a school. In the 1990s it became empty and increasingly derelict, until acquired by the Landmark Trust in 1997. Through extensive fundraising the Landmark Trust were able to repair and restore the project which took nearly two years and cost some £2.5 million, towards which English Heritage contributed £280,000, and during which a highlight was the discovery of several sections of Pugin's own wallpaper, preserved almost in their original state. There are regular public open-days.

With a high level of skill and craftsmanship the building has been restored to its original glory with such an attention to detail that we extracted limestone from the original French quarry used to build the home.
